



Summer Research Institute

Each year the SIUC McNair Scholars Program sponsors a Summer Research Institute (SRI). For eight weeks, students engage in a series of workshops that instruct them on the research process, professional development, and the Graduate Record Exam (GRE). All activities are designed to strengthen students' skill sets and prepare them for graduate study. This year, ten of our scholars worked diligently with their faculty mentors and the McNair staff to complete their research projects.

The summer began with an intensive orientation week that included workshops on understanding the research process, research methods, and investigating and selecting a graduate school. Students also participated in exercises that focused on goal setting, team building, and positive affirmations. The week ended with students stretching their limits by navigating the high ropes course at A Touch of Nature.

Once through orientation, students spent the rest of the summer studying for the GRE and completing their research projects. Two of our graduate advisors, R. Lynn Vaughn, (English Literature, MA Student) and Frank Palmer (Psychology, PhD Student), led review sessions on the verbal and quantitative sections of the GRE in conjunction with aiding students with their research. Communications, MA Student), our third graduate advisor, worked closely with the scholars to improve their research, presentations, and professional skills.

In addition to studying for the GRE, students prepared for our 4th annual Research Symposium, where each scholar gave a 12 minute PowerPoint presentation highlighting their research findings. Students also submitted a final research paper. Six of the best papers will be published in the McNair Journal.

Test Taking Tips for the GRE

Learn 10 words a day for 30 days.

Make your own flashcards or buy a flip book to help increase your vocabulary. If you are feeling adventurous, make yourself a podcast of vocabulary words. Check out the master wordlist posted on our website: www.siu.edu/~mcnair.

Read, Read, Read. Reading the newspaper or your favorite author will help increase your reading speed and comprehension.



Memorize the directions for each section.

Save time on the test by knowing what to do in each section.

Know where you stand.

Visit the Educational Testing Services (ETS) website at www.ets.org. They offer several services that can help you prepare for the GRE. Use Score It Now to find out how

your doing on the essay and use the PowerPrep software to take the GRE Practice Test. This will help familiarize you with the test format and show you where you can improve.



Basic Math.

Fill in key steps to your review with a high school math textbook. If you are still confused, ask your math whiz friend to help you with the tough problems.

Practice, Practice, Practice.

There's no way around it, you have to time yourself with each section by using previous tests. Check out the review sections at www.number2.com.
