Course Overview and Objectives:

This course will assist senior McNair Scholars in the identification of graduate school programs in their field of study and the preparation and submission of at least **three graduate school applications**. We will review the credentials that are necessary for acceptance into graduate school, identify the essential components of a graduate school application and establish a clear understanding of how to prepare for and succeed as a graduate student. Scholars will be given guidance on the selection of an appropriate graduate program and the development of a competitive application packet. We will explore the value and process of engaging in research and other professional activities and we will examine the graduate school and faculty experiences. The objectives of this graduate course is to allow students to:

- Identify graduate schools and develop a timeline for applications
- Compile application packets for graduate school
- Write a personal statement
- Develop a CV
- Network with faculty and graduate students in potential graduate schools
- Identify graduate school funding opportunities
- Develop an understanding of the "culture of the academy"
- Understand graduate student and faculty responsibilities

Learning Outcomes:

By the end of the semester, students will have the necessary tools to complete at least **three graduate school applications** for admission. In addition to offering a structured application process, we offer a supportive and interactive environment to help maneuver applying and attending graduate school, as well as resources on excelling in graduate school.

Structure of Seminar:

This seminar, similar to the traditional graduate school class structure begins with formal structures to complete basic tasks of the application process, and later moving toward the more individualized statement of purpose (SoP) and curriculum vitae (CV). This seminar is also a forum for students to ask questions and share experiences with their peers

Evaluation:

The final grade for the semester will be based on your successful completion of all listed assignments, as well as on your participation in class, and your contribution in discussions. As a seminar, active participation of all students is a requirement for passing the class.

Your participation in this class is an essential component to preparing your graduate school applications. Attendance is mandatory for this seminar and it will be strictly enforced.
